
HE FRIENDS





> (materials), The Friends of Algonquin Park (labour) and Ontario Parks (equipment and labour). The camboose fireplace was also renewed in 2012. The work was researched and

coordinated by Rory MacKay, a research archaeologist.

'The central fireplace or camboose was the focus of the culinary and social universe for the fifty-two shantymen who slept and ate in this kind of dwelling: the only source

of light; the only source of heat for cooking; the only warmth for fending off the bitter cold of an Algonquin winter's night.

In October 2012, Park maintenance staff, Mark Brown and Peter Palbiski, reconfigured the camboose. "Large wooden beams replaced the rock wall between the vertical support poles. An open-fronted ring of rocks was built on the sand. In the original shanties as much as a cord of wood would have been burned each day. A bean-hole was



added, to one side, in which large iron pots holding beans or bread to be baked would have been placed on a bed of coals and covered by glowing embers, ash and

hot sand. A fireplace crane or cramier, used to swing a large pot of boiled salt pork or tea over the fire, was constructed of hand-hewed black spruce poles. Thus, a more improved representation of a winter camp from over a century ago has been achieved." Be sure to visit the Logging Museum to see this and many other authentic exhibits!

MEET THE RESEARCHER DAY



WHAT IS PLANNED GIVING?

Planned giving allows you to make a gift to Algonquin Park today where the value of the gift is deferred in whole or in part until a later date, often upon the death of the donor and depending on the type of gift, income tax relief is either realized today or in the future. Of course, talking to your lawyer or financial planner will help you and your family decide how to best fulfill your legacy to Algonquin Park.



You could make a difference and ensure your legacy in Algonquin Park by considering these options:

Gift of Real Estate - the gift of real estate allows you to give an immediate gift and receive an immediate tax receipt for the fair market value of your property. These gifts include: residences, farms, land and commercial property. Giving a gift of real estate allows you to simplify your estate and give to The Friends of Algonquin Park during your lifetime.
