2021 DIRECTORS AWARD

On April 24, 2021, The Friends of Algonquin Park presented the 2021 Directors Award to Frank Kuiack, for his contributions to the appreciation of Algonquin Park, during an informal ceremony held at the Algonquin Park Visitor Centre.

Frank Kuiack was a full-time Algonquin Park fishing guide who started his career at just 8 years of age. Over the decades, Frank fished in countless lakes in the Park and gained a significant knowledge that he shared with scientists, clients and children. Frank was also a storyteller and was almost as famous for his one-of-a-kind personality as he was for his fishing.

His skills, personality and stories attracted the attention of writers, journalists and authors. He was profiled in several articles and his story was told in two books by Ron Corbett, The Last Guide, and The Last Guide's Guide. Despite this notoriety, Frank always remained true to himself, kind, funny and eager to fish.

Frank gave a lot back to the Park. He spent countless days contributing to the Rock Bass Family Fishing Day at Whitefish every year and he was a regular donor to the Friends of Algonquin Park annual fundraising raffle.

Sadly, Frank Kuiack passed away on May 4, 2021 at the age of 87, leaving behind a lasting legacy. He will be deeply missed by the Algonquin Park community including Park staff, visitors and everyone at The Friends of Algonquin Park.



RORY MACKAY RECEIVES PAPA AWARD





the park's interpretive program.
His systematic use of the media
shook the Ontario public out of its
complacency, encouraging more
public input into the decisionmaking process for Algonquin
Park. He fostered the growth of

2023 ALGONQUIN PARK CALENDAR

The 12-month full colour Algonquin Park calendar has stunning photographs by former Park naturalist Michael Runtz. This 30.5cm x 23cm (9"x12") calendar makes a great conversation starter or a great gift for those with a special connection to Algonquin Park. It includes wonderful images of Algonquin's scenery and wildlife throughout the year, and each month is accompanied by a naturalist's message.

FIELD GUIDE TO FOREST ECOSYSTEMS OF CENTRAL ONTARIO

The Forest Ecosystem Classification is part of a larger Ecological Land Classification initiative in Ontario. This field guide focuses on forest ecosystems. A continuum of ecosites exists, from non-forested terrestrial sites, to forested terrestrial sites, to forested terrestrial and wetland sites to non-forested wetlands.

ALGONQUIN STORY

Algonquin Story is Back in Print! — The Friends of Algonquin Park is pleased to announce the reprinting of Algonquin Story. Written by Audrey Saunders Miller (1913 - 1993), this book was originally published in

1946. MacKay, author of *Algonquin Park: A Place Like No Other*, plus an index of people and places mentioned in the text. New maps have also been added.





Don Lloyd (1932-2013) first started paddling in Algonquin Park in 1945 and paddled many of Algonquin Park's lakes over the next sixty years. Don infused his knowledge and love of Algonquin Park into this classic trip planning book creating a fine bedside or campsite read. Use it to plan, or dream about, your next Algonquin Park canoe trip.

In Memory of DEAR FRIENDS



Edward "Ray" Townsend (1925 - 2021)

Ray received the FOAP Directors Award in 1998 for his significant contributions to the appreciation of Algonquin Provincial Park. In 1975 he accepted a position as Operations Superintendent with the Algonquin Forestry Authority in Algonquin Park, which Ray claimed was the best job of his career. Ray spent many years attending Loggers Day as the exhibitor at the dam & chute.



Dr. Alan Gordon (1929 - 2019)

Al received the FOAP Directors Award in 1992 for his outstanding contributions to the appreciation of Algonquin Provincial Park. Dr. Gordon was a research scientist focusing on forest genetics, soil chemistry and ecosystem productivity. He inspired and mentored Junior Rangers and shared his knowledge of the forest and his powers of observation with many student field crews inspiring them to appreciate the natural world. His passion for forests and forestry lives on in the Alan Gordon Acadian Park, in Ottawa, and Gordon's Grove, in Algonquin Park, which are both named after him.

WHAT IS PLANNED GIVING?

Of course, talking to your lawyer or financial advisor will help you and your family decide how to best fulfill your legacy to Algonquin Park.

YOUR ALGONQUIN LEGACY GIVING OPTIONS

You can make a difference and ensure your legacy in Algonquin Park by considering these options:

Bequest - This is a gift that you make through your will. It can be for a specific amount, a percentage of your estate or the residual of your estate. Your bequest will symbolize a lasting memorial for you and your family.

Gift of Life Insurance - Life insurance is a way to make a significant gift in the future at an affordable current cost without reducing the value of your estate available to your family. You can either give an existing policy or take out a new policy naming The Friends of Algonquin Park as the beneficiary.

Shares or Securities - This can be established by contributing bonds, stock securities or mutual funds that have appreciated in value since their purchase and avoid capital gains tax.

Registered Assets (RRSPs & RRIFs) - A gift of registered assets would enable you to fulfill dual goals of supporting your favourite charity while reducing the amount of taxes that your estate would have to pay. If the RRSP or RRIF has The Friends of Algonquin Park as the direct beneficiary, the estate will receive a donation receipt for the entire value of the plan.

Gift of Real Estate - The gift of real estate allows you to give an immediate gift and receive an immediate tax receipt for the fair market value of your property. These gifts include: residences, farms, land and commercial property. Giving a gift of real estate allows you to simplify your estate and give to The Friends of Algonquin Park during your lifetime

Residual Interest - This type of gift is given by those who plan to donate a property through a will beguest but would like to reduce income tax presently and continue to use and enjoy the property over their lifetime.

Endowment - Your charitable fund would be invested and earnings from your contribution would generate a reliable source of funds, providing a legacy that lasts forever
